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## The Summer Book Program...page one

Wednesday, July 1st found Susan and Anita at Reiche School with PPS lunch givers, Alice and Debbie. Alice and Debbie fed lunches to 21 kids while we fed the minds of 39 neighborhood friends. Our most popular age group today was 4-6 year olds with15 books distributed! 11 books went to 6-8 yr olds; baby books are being chewed by 8 little ones and 5 more books went to the big kids.

Thank you so much to our ADDITONAL book stickerer/baggers!! Sarah, Roberta, Martha G, Pam L and Martha D. all stickered and bagged books at home for our Summer Lunches program!! With the original "Payson Park Gang", that makes 13 Altrusans working on this part of our Foundation Grant activity! We've distributed 200 books on 3 lunch visits!!

On a warm and sultry morning, Anita and Susan set up shop at Riverton School. We joined Kari and Susanne at their covered spot and waited for the hungry hordes to arrive..... it IS a steamy day.... maybe they went to the lake. We very much enjoyed the company of Susanne and Kari as we distributed books and lunches. Altrusa gave away 31 books....4 to babies; 7 to 3-6 yr. olds; 7 to the 6-8 age group; 4 to the 8-10 yr. olds; 5 to the 10-12 yr olds and 4 to the over 12 yr olds. We had a good time....despite scaring a toddler with our masks...and books. He thought he was at the DOCTOR'S office

When you tell a 5 year old to say "underpants" when you're taking his photo, his eyes light right up!!! And he chortles and looks guiltily at his dad. Anita and Susan saw that happen at Deering 'a summer lunch program on July 15th. Brady was one of 6 kiddos to take a book from our 3-6 year old stash. We had 8 "babies" and 10 6-8 year olds. We distributed 7 books to the 8-10 year olds; 5 to the 10-12 year olds and another 5 to the "old folks"...over 12.

A recommendation for an excellent, relevant book for everyone (12+) is <u>Ghost Boys</u> by Jewell Parker Rhodes. It's historical...current... A 12 yr.old boy of color is shot by a white police officer and Jerome's ghost returns to observe the devastation his community suffers. So good.

Anita heard a mom say the most heartwarming thing today. An everyday visitor to the King Middle lunch site, mom gathered up her families' lunches....and a BIG green Locker Project bag of groceries and looked appreciatively at her childrens' books. When Anita invited her to look at our books for "those over 12", she beamed and chose 2 for herself and remarked, " this is just like Christmas today." Gina reported that Summer Lunch served 38 lunches today. Altrusa distributed 47 books. This was a good way to spend a summer morning!!!

Esme and Sean greeted Anita and Susan when we (finally) found our way to Munjoy South playground. It's a delightful green space nestled in the heart of Munjoy Hill. July 29th found 31 kids eating lunch and 35 readers selecting books.

Monday, August 3rd found Anita and Susan back with our old friend, Jay, at Lyman Moore. We finished up our 7 "assigned" sites on July 29th and decided to return to where we started on June 19th, with Jay. We finished up with 207 books going home with families on August 3rd!!! What a summer for readers!!

Our summer has been delightful...
...distributing books as PPS distributes
lunches. We've met lots of children and
lots of dedicated PPS employees
determined to feed these kids. As we
completed our final stop, we realized
we still had nearly 200 books
remaining. Lyman Moore was our
"highpoint" in terms of books given... so
back we went. We were able to offer
kids TWO books each ..all stickered
"Courtesy of Altrusa". Lots of families,
including Moms and Dads, were
recipients of our FOUNDATION grant
money and Portland Altrusans' efforts.



### **An Altrusan Lost**

Eleanore M. Irish died on Sunday, March 22, 2020, at the great age of 102. She became an Altrusan in 1954 and served as the Portland club's president for the 1959/1960 year. After 57 years of dedication to Altrusa she became an Emeritus member in 2011.


Eleanore was a dedicated health professional, who spent her entire career in the public health sector, most of it with Maine Medical Center in Portland. She was a past-president and very active member of the Southern Maine Area Agency on Aging. Even after her retirement, Eleanore didn't let age define her. Eleanore had a passion for learning. She was involved with the Senior College at the University of Southern Maine since its inception and she continued to take classes there until she was 98.



After moving to the Bay Square at Yarmouth, she continued to grow her mind through small discussion classes and different travel presentations. Eleanore was a great traveler. She was always looking for new and interesting places to visit. Along with her good friend, Mickey Purkis, she traveled to six of the seven continents (only missing Antarctica). One of her favorite trips was across Russia on the Trans Siberian Railroad taking Russian lessons. Even at the age of 95, she took a cruise through the Baltic Sea.

When not traveling, Eleanore would watch her favorite sports teams, especially the Boston Bruins and Red Sox. Eleanore loved to play golf, only to give it up in her 90s.

Eleanore was predeceased by her parents, Burton and Thelma Irish, her brother, Walden Irish and her two sisters, Natalie Garrity and Marjorie Culman. She leaves behind several nieces, nephews, grand-nieces, grand-nephews, and cousins, many who considered her as part of their immediate family.
