



Altrusans travel Downeast to deliver books

It seemed so early! But Martha pulled into my driveway at 7:30 am on Tuesday, October 3rd, raring to go. Off we went to gather up Anita and we were off...at 7:50!

We'd previously loaded Susan's car with 470 books destined for Milbridge and Jonesport! Sunny and warm, we headed to our first stop, Ellsworth. In Ellsworth, we consulted Anita's directions and Martha's DeLorme atlas. A gas stop and a quick bathroom break and we were back on our way.



Milbridge is a town of about 1,300 situated in the heart of Maine's wild blueberry country. Many of the first generation Mainers brought their families north from Latino countries. Milbridge Elementary School, has been getting national attention for its innovations and successes with ELL students. The school reports 33 percent of its kindergarten class is Hispanic. Their newsletters are sent home in English and Spanish. The local library conducts story hour in both languages. We found our way to the school and promptly met Charles, the custodian, who happily loaded his hand truck with our cartons of books. He and Ms. Lisee (the principal) were **thrilled** with our donation.

Next stop is Jonesport which is the home of a large lobster-fishing fleet. At the end of a lovely peninsula, we (eventually) found ourselves at Jonesport Elementary , a preK- grade 8 school of 100 students. Lisa, the school's secretary welcomed us warmly and enthusiastically. John Reese, the school's new principal was delighted to meet us and welcomed our books!



Finally, we were off to D. W. Merritt to meet Ms. Lorna Greene. Ms. Greene, principal of a 96 student K-6 school was also happy to meet us. 49% of her students qualify for free and reduced lunch. She was pleased to hear that she could give our books to classroom libraries, the school library or send them home with individual students.

With our book deliveries completed, we decided lunch was in order. We stopped at the Mexican take-out run by the Vazquez family in Milbridge! YUM!



Our final stop before heading for Portland was Momo's in Ellsworth. Momo's Cheesecakes, the first official cheesecake shop in Maine! Momo's offers over 60 flavors of cheesecake daily. She is OPEN 24/7 and is *self serve!*

We arrived home in Anita's driveway at 8pm. We had a full and busy day and felt great about Altrusa and the generous nature of all of us!

Our Service Projects

Books Behind Bars Had a Banner Year!

In the past we have simply asked our members to donate 'gently used' books for the local prisons. This year Christine from the Communication Committee took it an extra step. Not only did she put the request out on Facebook, but she also put out a request for books on the 'NextDoor' App. It was amazing to see the responses that we got.

People are so generous. Roughly a dozen people responded and donated hundreds of books. Christine and Pam L. collected books from these people, and with the books donated by Altrusans, we (Arlene Hanson, Project Chair, Christine Johnson, Marie Pike, Wanda Pettersen, Anita Chandler, Trish Maxim and Pam Lemieux) ended up sorting and labeling **853** 'gently used' books on Thursday, October 19th, finishing the process on Monday, October 23rd.

On Monday, these were divided between the 3 prison systems that would receive the donated books. The following Altrusans were assigned to deliver these books: Wanda took the books earmarked for Windham Correctional, Anita took the Cumberland County Prison books and Arlene oversaw delivery of the Androscoggin County Prison books.

This Service Project is a favorite of Arlene Hanson. Arlene is what we affectionately call a 'Snow Bird'. She is heading to Florida next week. It was great that this project was finished before she left.

Books-A-Million BookDrive




We are SO LUCKY!!!!

Ability Service Training Responsibility Achievement



ASTRA alive and very well at Lake Region High School

Prior to COVID we had 45 members in ASTRA at Lake Region High School, which was an increase from the 20 that CHARTERED the club 3 years earlier on February 1, 2017.

On March 16, 2020 school closed for the rest of that school year, due to the COVID pandemic, with hopes of re-opening in the Fall.

Re-opening did <u>not</u> happen and 12 ASTRA Seniors had graduated in June of 2020. The entire 2020-2021 school year was accomplished by 'Remote Learning' via the students' home computers. ASTRA struggled with low attendance during ZOOM type meetings and very few Community Service projects happened. No "ABC" books were distributed that year. And another 12 Seniors graduated in June 2021. ASTRA Advisor, Carinne Fournier, resigned from teaching to stay home with her enlarging family.

Re-opening <u>did</u> happen in the 2021-2022 school year for 'In-person' classes. We had a new ASTRA Advisor, Guidance Counselor Kristina Theriault, but only 15 students from the now Senior and Junior classes. Because of the continuing COVID concerns, ASTRA was not allowed to visit the Elementary schools for their "ABC" project, so they simply delivered the generous supply of B.A.M. books from Altrusa to the front door of each school. At year end, we graduated another 9 ASTRA Seniors (June 2022).

By the start of the 2022-2023 year, activities were beginning to return to normal. Unfortunately we had less than 20 members by then, but we were allowed back into the Elementary schools to resume "ABC" readings and book distributions.

That brings us to this school year (2023-2024). The first ASTRA meeting was scheduled for Thursday, October 5th during "Laker Time" 7:30 - 8:05 AM. Altrusan Debbie Lemieux was there for support. Having no idea what to expect for attendance, imagine our delight when <u>21</u> students poured into the Library conference room for the meeting! Plans were made to have meetings on the 1st & 3rd Thursday mornings each month. The election of Officers would take place via email and be announced at the next meeting in 2 weeks. And at that same October 19th meeting, ASTRA students should be prepared to go outside and weed the Tulip Garden.

At the second meeting, the 15 ASTRANs attending, welcomed our Altrusa District One 'Immediate Past Governor', Pam Lemieux, from the Portland club. Pam delivered ASTRA's 3rd place <u>International</u> award for their "Yellow Tulip" Service Project. The award is a Certificate which is to be placed in ASTRA's display cabinet and a \$100 check for their Treasury. Both had been presented to Pam at Altrusa's biennial International Convention in San Antonio, Texas in July. (The "Yellow Tulip" Service Project was written in 2022 by then ASTRA President Rebecca

Caron.)
