
Altrusa International Foundation Grants

Altrusa and ASTRA Clubs chartered September 1, 2019 or later may receive a one-time grant up to \$2,000 to begin service in their communities.

The application must be received within one year of the charter date. The grant recipient is obligated to use the grant award for the intended purpose and must file a report within one year after the grant is awarded.

The ASTRA Club Service Award has been established by Altrusa International and sponsored by Altrusa International Foundation to encourage ASTRA Clubs to actively participate in service projects designed to meet specific needs in the local community or within their own school community.

This award is an opportunity for Altrusa International to recognize outstanding ASTRA Clubs for their achievements in service through District and International Competition.

Service projects nominated for the ASTRA Service Award are judged each year at District Conferences. First-place winners from each District are entered in the competition at the International Level.

Established judging criteria are used by Districts and by International. Projects will be assessed by impartial judges based on their merits and results. One (1) service project from Clubs-At-Large may be included in the competition at the International level. This service project selection will be organized and overseen by the International ASTRA Committee.

Procedure for Submitting Entries:

ASTRA Clubs submit entries for the District competition to their District ASTRA Chairman, or person appointed by the Governor, by the District's deadline or no later than a MARCH 1st DEADLINE (for all districts).

Entries must be submitted in PDF format unless specified otherwise by the District and must be received by March 1st. Entries received late or that do not comply with guidelines will not be considered.



The Project Grant Applications must be emailed by the due date to foundation @altrusa.org.

Do **not mail** applications to the Chicago office. A confirmation email will be sent to you when the application is received.

There are two funding cycles each fiscal year:

Cycle 1: Applications due **September 15**Cycle 2: Applications due **March 15**

In addition, Altrusa and ASTRA Clubs chartering now may receive a one-time grant up to \$2,000 to begin service in their communities. The application must be received within one year of the charter date.

The Altrusa International Foundation, Inc. reserves the right to make the final decision on all applications. The grant recipient is obligated to use the grant award for the intended purpose and must file a report within one year after the grant is awarded.

Altrusa Clubs, **ASTRA Clubs**, and Districts may apply for one service grant per cycle in the fiscal year, and all applicants must agree to the terms of the grant. If an application is not awarded Foundation funds, the Club or District may reapply in the next cycle.



A Labor of love: Santa Maria High Schoolers Raise Guide Dogs for the Blind

Righetti High School has a new student this year who is set apart from the other pupils, and not just because of her trademark green vest — Calista is an 11-month-old guide dog puppy in training, and her teacher is Righetti freshman Sam McDonald.

Sam, 14, is socializing a future guide dog through the Guide Dogs for the Blind program's <u>Santa Maria Puppy Raisers</u> chapter, which formed in 1990 and trains canines to be service companions for visually impaired and blind individuals.

As Calista's "raiser," Sam has cared for the puppy since she was 6 weeks old, and since late summer has brought her nearly everywhere she goes. Whether it be school, the store, the doctor's office or the barn where she rides horses, Sam brings Calista with the goal of training her to remain calm and focused in different social situations.

By coming to school with Sam, Calista has learned how to calmly navigate crowded hallways, quiet classrooms, and even earthquake and evacuation drills, staying close to Sam's side despite distractions.

"I knew it was gonna be a lot of work, but I didn't know it was gonna be that much work. It was like having a baby, and I was with her all the time," Sam said, remembering when she first received Calista in January. "I didn't know how'd she act going in public with us, but she honestly did amazing on the first day, and she was getting lots of compliments."

Mandy, Sam's mom and Righetti's Career Center specialist, said the Santa Maria Joint Union High School District has been very gracious in allowing us to have her with us," Mandy said, adding that one of Sam's teachers even made a progress report for Calista.

After the dogs reach around 20 months, they are brought back to the main Guide Dogs for the Blind campus in San Rafael for intensive training. If they pass the required certifications, they will be paired with a visually impaired or blind individual, or otherwise become a breeder or be adopted.

MacDonald said she is grateful for families like Sam and Mandy who commit their time to raising these dogs.

"It's really all about love and time," she said.
