#### **Governor's Report**

#### Governor's Report on the District One 2022 Annual Conference

The District One 66<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference was held at the North Conway Grand Hotel on April 22-24, 2022. The Theme was 'Opening the Door to Service'. It was hosted by the New Hampshire Altrusa Clubs (Carroll County, Laconia, and Meredith), with the president of each club (Nancy Spaulding, Susan Clauson, and Sylvia Detscher) working together as co-hosts.

#### Friday, April 22nd

From 2:00PM until 5:00PM, there was a **Hands on Service Project, 'Days for Girls'** set up for Altrusans arriving on Friday to participate in. Claire and Steve Behrle brought material, sewing machines, ironing board and all the tools needed for the project. Claire and Steve led the workshop. They explained the components of a "kit", gave a demo on how the components are created and helped guide participants in constructing the pieces. The non-sewers were given the opportunity to fabric, iron, apply snaps, thread ribbons on



bags, trace templates and fold liners, underwear, and washcloths. The sewers were set up to sew the bags and shields together as well as serge the liners and transport pouches.

Feedback from participants was incredibly positive about this service project. It allowed them to see all the piece parts of the project and Claire volunteered to meet after the conference with any clubs interested in bringing the Days for Girls Project to their home clubs.

The host clubs staffed the registration desk from 5:00PM-7:00PM and distributed to the attendees the 'goody' bag they had assembled for the conference.

#### First Business Session started at 9AM.

Altrusa was established in Nashville, Tennessee, USA in 1917. Carrying the flag of the United States of America, Sylvia Detscher of Altrusa International of Meredith, New Hampshire.

Canada became a part of Altrusa in 1945. Carrying the flag of Canada, Jackie Maciejewski of Altrusa International of Merrimack Valley Massachusetts.

Bermuda became a part of Altrusa in 1948. Carrying the flag of Bermuda, Susan Ulino of Altrusa International of Northeastern Connecticut.

ASTRA became a part of Altrusa International in 1966. District One has an ASTRA Club at Lake Region High School, in Naples, Maine. Carrying the ASTRA flag, Trish Maxim of Altrusa International of Portland, Maine.

Altrusa achieved international status in 1935. Carrying the Altrusa International flag, Jennifer Belcher of Altrusa International of Plymouth County, Massachusetts.

Following the Flag Ceremony, Beth Dyson of the Carroll County Altrusa Club gave the Invocation.

The members of the head table were introduced by Governor Pam Lemieux.

**Conference Co-hosts, Susan Clauson, and Nancy Spaulding, welcomed the group** to North Conway New Hampshire and also read a **Commendation to Altrusa District One** that was issued by the New Hampshire State Governor, Christopher Sununu.

Ann Marie Snyer, of the Merrimack Valley, MA Altrusa Club, serving as Conference Parliamentarian, covered the **adoption of the Conference Rules**.

The **Registration and Credentials Report** details were presented and at that time there were 64 members, 12 clubs (5 absent clubs were Bangor, Bermuda, Greater Hartford, Quebec, and Sanford-Springvale) and 4 guests registered. The Credential Report showed 24 delegates, 7 District Officers, and 4 Past Governors in attendance for a total of 35 eligible voters. (Note: The Conference Booklet is posted on the District One Website with all the detailed information for registration and credentials ....and also the Award winners)

The budget with actuals year to date posted was distributed to the membership and reviewed by Wanda Pettersen, the District One Treasurer. She explained that last year we approve a 2 year budget (2021 thru 2023) and this year there was no need to vote on the budget.

Nominating Committee for 2022-2024 Election The Nominating Committee for 2020-2022 (Mary Faries of Bermuda, Chair, Lucille Prescott of Greater Biddeford-Saco, ME and Charlene Muscato of Merrimack Valley, MA) presented a slate of three nominees for the 2022-2024 Nominating Committee: Anne Rash of Northeastern, CT, Sandra LaBonte of Seacoast, ME, and Joan Osborne of Plymouth County, MA. The Governor then asked if there were any nominations from the floor. This was asked 3 times. There were no nominations from the floor. Normally we would have an election with more than 3 nominees, and we would elect 3 to serve, with the nominee receiving the most votes to serve as the Chair of the Committee. The Governor shared with the membership that the District One Board met on Friday evening and passed a policy revision, effective immediately, in the event that there are only three nominees, The secretary will be asked to cast a ballot for the slate as presented and the newly elected members of the Nominating Committee will select the chair among themselves and let the District One Board know who the chair is before their next business meeting. Since this was the case, The District One Secretary, Marie Pike cast the ballot for the slate. The Governor declared the candidates duly elected members of the 2022-2024 Nominating Committee.



#### **9AM Second Business Session**

The **Registration and Credentials Report** were updated. The Registration new numbers were 64 members, 13 clubs (the 4 absent clubs were Bangor, Bermuda, Quebec, and Sanford-Springvale) and 4 guests registered. The Credential Report showed 25 delegates, 8 District Officers, and 4 Past Governors in attendance for a total of 37 eligible voters.

**Budget Review** Treasurer, Wanda Pettersen asked if there were any questions concerning the budget information that was distributed on Saturday morning. While there were no questions about the budget as presented, Pat Jackowski of the Central CT Altrusa Club, asked the Board to consider helping the local clubs with membership recruitment and retention expenses. (Note: The Board met at the end of the Conference and discussed this request and agreed to institute a Club Revitalization Grant. The process and the resulting policy revisions are being worked on and should be available soon.)

**Awards** were presented in the following categories.

#### **ASTRA**

Governor, Pam Lemieux presented the ASTRA Service Award to the District One ASTRA Liaison, Trish Maxim for the Lakes Region Maine ASTRA Club. Their submission was:

#### Yellow Tulip Project - ASTRA of Lake Region High School

Lake Region High School ASTRA participates in a mental health initiative called the 'Yellow Tulip Project' The ASTRA members maintain a garden of tulips at the school in solidarity with those experiencing mental illness. The goal of the project is to increase awareness of mental health. In the fall of 2021, the entire ASTRA Club participated in maintaining the garden.

After consulting with Staff, they voted to purchase heat register covers and new metal baseboards to improve the bedrooms at the facility. All member participated in securing the materials.

## Holiday Cheer - Northeastern CT

Altrusa International of Northeastern Connecticut, working with Eastern CT Veteran's Center, Next Step Cottage, and the Storrs Congregational Church, designed projects that would involve all club members and bring smiles and holiday cheer to individuals and families. Projects included donating books, providing toiletries, decorating cookies, and more. These projects provided both hands on opportunities, and work at home activities.

#### Other Award Contenders were (in alphabetical order by club):

#### Adopting Grace House – Carroll County, NH

Carroll County Altrusa provides Comfort Bags to Grace House: a safe house for Victims of Domestic and Sexual Violence. The bags are a shower caddy that contain items needed for personal care. Also included are a personal note of encouragement and some kind of treat selected by the shopper. The plan is to make this a sustainable project.

#### Pamper Me Gift Bags - Central CT

We had lots of FUN getting together on our first club gathering (Halloween) in over a year on October 27th and packaging goodies for the ladies at New Horizons. Twenty gift bags were donated (and extra supplies too!) for their use on Thursday, October 28th, celebrating October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and Make a Difference Day.

#### **Letha H Brown Literacy Award**

District One Director, Hilda Schmidt presented the Letha H Brown Literacy Awards to the following clubs:

#### 1st Place

#### Amen (Altrusa Meets Educational Needs) - Meredith, NH

The past two school years have shown an increase in young students whose reading skills are below grade-level – in large part due to covid-related issues such as mask-wearing, remote learning, and disrupted home situations. Altrusa volunteers are providing supplemental reading support on a weekly basis by facilitating small group activities in the classroom to strengthen reading skills. **2**nd **Place** 

#### **Building Bridges With Books - Seacoast**

"Building Bridges With Books" is a literacy project created to bring reading into the lives of vulnerable children. Dover Children's Home and Altrusa of the Seacoast worked in tandem to provide books for different skill sets, diversities, and therapeutic needs. The benefit of reading, augments developmental strength and growth, helping to shape the residents to be productive, responsible adults.

#### 3rd Place

#### AltrusaPortlandGivesBooks.org - Portland, ME

Portland Altrusans were sitting on a treasure trove of books for kids 8-18 years old, but we struggled to distribute them. Our website, altrusaportlandgivesbooks.org was created to reach the older siblings of the kindergarten students we'd visited with our longstanding ABC project. We are thrilled that our website enables us to provide more youth with books of their own.

#### Other Award Contenders were (in alphabetical order by club):

#### Make Way for Readers - Carroll County, NH

Only 48% of 3rd graders in Carroll County demonstrate a proficiency in reading, our club partnered with local libraries and preschools to promote the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten program. Children received book bags, bookmarks, and library information, the class received a class book, and libraries received funds to promote the program. Success will see an increase in participation in the program.

#### Girls Love Mail – Central Connecticut

Girls Love Mail is an organization that collects inspiring, uplifting and encouraging mail to send to women with a recent Breast Cancer Diagnosis. While safely quarantining during COVID times, we stumbled upon this project and started writing inspiring and uplifting messages. Over fifty letters were submitted during October, Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

#### Books for Everyone - Northeastern Connecticut

Putting books in children's and families' hands is the key to literacy.

Altrusa of NECT provides books to non-profit agencies for take away libraries and literacy events. Grants fund the purchase of books and members sort, insert bookmarks, and deliver books to eight agencies four times a year. Over 3000 books were delivered in the past year.

Congratulations to these three District One Clubs who were able to obtain funding for their service projects through the International Altrusa Foundation. Now you need to put these funds to good use and by May 15, 2023\* submit a write up to International, documenting what you did.

#### The Altrusa International Foundation offers grants twice a year.

<sup>\*</sup>Grant Follow-Up Reports are due to the Altrusa International Foundation, Inc. office one year after the award is granted.

Applicants may request between \$250 and \$4,000. The number of grants funded, and the amount of each grant, is dependent upon available funds. In Cycle 2 (April 2022) the Altrusa International Foundation awarded \$156,196.00 to multiple clubs and projects. If a project is not awarded a grant during a Grant Cycle, they can resubmit their proposal during the next Grant Cycle.

A grant recipient is obligated to use the grant award for the intended purpose and must file a report within one year after the grant is awarded. However, if the grant is not used for the intended purpose, it must be returned in full to the Foundation.

Altrusa Clubs, ASTRA Clubs, and Districts may apply for one service grant per cycle in the fiscal year and all applicants must agree to the terms of the grant.

If you missed applying for a grant in Cycle 2, get ready to submit one in for Cycle 1 in September 2022.

- URL of Altrusa International Website
- International news
- Wrap up of convention (every 2 years)

#### Altrusa accent:

Altrusa fact (historical point or Altrusa news)

You don't have to start large, sometimes a simple bulletin with pertinent information is a good start. I often send out a calendar of events for our members to keep handy as a reminder of important dates coming up.


