

Tidbits from Altrusa International – District One 2023 Conference By Linda Ring, Past Governor of District One

From International President-Elect, Linda Smith:

- Membership is down overall by 115 members, attributed mostly to the pandemic. For a small district, we are doing quite well!
 - Encouraged us to sponsor new clubs in areas not presently served.
 - Remember to update Group Tally with new committee chairs and officers. Why? International Board and Chairs will use this information to reach out to the appropriate chairs.
- Communications
 - Remember to **use the Photo Release form** when taking photos at club events, ESPECIALLY if minors are involved.
- Leadership
 - Review the International website for updated manuals in many categories.
 - Treasurer's Guide
 - Records Retention Guidelines
- Service
 - Reminding all to send in your count of books and literacy hours for the Million Books project by June 1.
 - Use the **Service Project Database** to find new ideas for service projects. (Linda's note: It's a good idea to insert your project synopsis that was submitted for District Awards!)
- Convention San Antonio, June 19-23
 - Instead of an off-site event, we are staying put at the hotel and running a fundraiser for Foundation. On Friday night, there will be dueling pianos and a cash bar. Remember that the more you bid, the more likely your request will be played!
 - Should be an easy business session. There is only ONE by-law for discussion.
 - Your convention board is saving money by NOT providing a convention bag. If you are coming to Convention, remember to bring your favorite tote.
 - Convention Service Project will be in support of Child Protective Services. Watch for the International Altrusan for details on collecting school supplies and stuffed animals.
 - Selling ads for the convention brochure. If you wanted to recognize an Altrusan, or toot your club horn, ads are \$250/full page, \$150/half page, and \$50/business card size.
- International Office Move
 - The International Office move was a strategic one to save money for the organization. Currently we pay over \$6,000/ month rent. The new location will be about \$2500/month. Due to contractor delays, the move was postponed to May 15th. Either way, we must vacate the current office in downtown Chicago by May 31.
 - New address is: 1400 E Touhy Ave, Suite 410, Des Plaines, IL 60018
 - The new location is very close to O'Hare airport. There is a Wyndham hotel next door that will serve our needs for overnight stays and meeting space.

Altrusa International District One BRR Report – April 2023

I am so proud to represent District One as your BRR (Bylaws, Resolutions and Recommendations) Chair and I am pleased to report that this past year we had activity for this District Chair. Director, Hilda Schmidt made her District visit to the NECT Club and they requested the possibility of changing the wording of the Altrusa Grace and Benediction to be more inclusive and diverse. Upon receiving this request, NECT President Carlita Cotton, PhD submitted the required forms from International to me and I forwarded them to International BRR Chair, Donna Johnson.

After an email delay, Donna Johnson brought the proposed change before the International Board at their January 18, 2023, Board Meeting. Donna Johnson report to me was that this request was brought before the Board in prior years and the discussion around the recommendation has always resolved to the fact that a District or Club is free to adapt the Grace and/or Benediction to fit with their perspective. That knowledge is the basis upon which the Board, by consensus, disapproved this proposal.

After receiving this response, I met with District One Governor, Pam Lemieux, Governor-Elect, Rita Cote and Immediate Past Governor, Linda Ring. Upon review of the International Bylaws, Polices and Procedures and Encyclopedia, there is no mention of the ability to adapt the Grace and/or Benediction. I forwarded an email to International BRR Chair, Donna Johnson asking if there could be a recommendation to change/add wording to the Altrusa Encyclopedia. She reported she would present a recommendation to the International Board to include wording in the Altrusa Encyclopedia to meet club and district perspectives and diverse members.

Donna Johnson and I had a Zoom meeting where I learned that a recommendation does have to be in the form of a Bylaw or Policy change. A recommendation to change something in a living document such as the Altrusa Encyclopedia may be discussed and voted by the Board and put into place immediately. I drafted and sent a recommendation to see the following modifications to the Altrusa Encyclopedia to the Benediction, Grace and I included the Collect. I requested the modification in the Altrusa Encyclopedia to include wording in parenthesis so Clubs and Districts are aware that modifications to the Benediction, Collect and Grace could be adapted by Clubs and Districts. This recommendation was brought before the International Board at their March 18, 2023, Board Meeting.

I received an email from Donna Johnson alerting me that the recommendation from Altrusa International District One to modify the International Encyclopedia as presented, was approved by the International Board of Directors, and will be added to the International Encyclopedia immediately. I am pleased to report that Altrusa International has updated the Altrusa Encyclopedia to reflect the additional information.

Many thanks to International Chair, Donna Johnson, the NECT Club under the direction of Carlita Cotton, PhD, the Altrusa International District One and Altrusa International Board of Directors for their guidance, patience, and attention to make this change. Carlita, your mother, Past International President, District One Alexinia Baldwin would be proud.

Current Treasurer, Wanda Pettersen, presented the current year finances to March 31, 2023 and proposed budget for the biennium 2023-2025. I requested the current holdings of the District in savings, checking and CD and the District is financially solvent. Breakout 2 – "Stand up and be President-A review of the Job for incoming and wannabees" and "What is your book club reading? Come share your favorite."

Notes from Communication Chair

Communications Tidbits

Ever wonder why computer geeks use such weird naming conventions? There's actually a really good reason!

Naming a file with date in YY-MM-DD format instead of MONTH-YEAR.

 Being consistent with naming files helps with archiving. Always call your files the same thing... Altrusa Meeting Agenda YY-MM-DD. In the folder, they will sort in chronological order this way. If you are using MONTH-YEAR format... April-2023 comes before January-2023.

If you keep your meeting materials in the same folder...

- You can sort by name to get your agendas, minutes, financial reports bunched together AND sorted by time.
- You can sort by DATE MODIFIED to get the most recent information at the top (or bottom), so all your May 2023 materials float to the top!

I like to use Quick Parts to create a self documenting footer on Documents.

- In WORD create a Self-Documenting Footer:
 - Press INSERT, then FOOTER. Choose blank.
 - Press INSERT, then QUICK PARTS, then FIELD, Choose FILENAME.
 - Press TAB once or twice to get the cursor to the right margin.
 - Press INSERT, then QUICK PARTS, then FIELD.
 - Press PAGE, then add a '/', then press NUMPAGES.
 - Highlight the whole footer, then press QUICK PARTS, AUTO TEXT, and choose SAVE (at the bottom of the window.
 - NOW, you can use this for any document!
- To USE the self-documenting footer:
 - Press INSERT, then FOOTER. Choose blank.
 - Press INSERT, then QUICK PARTS, then AUTO TEXT. Choose the footer you created.
- Once it is in your document... if you save it as something new (let's say you take last month's agenda and update it for next month...
 - Save the document with a new name.
 - Go into the FOOTER area and select the file name. Right click and choose UPDATE FIELD.

I hope this helps you develop some good naming conventions for your digital archives.

Notes from Leadership team

When I was asked to write a little about leadership, I began to think about the many leaders throughout my life who have influenced me. They are too numerous to name, but I realize they all had some qualities in common that I aspire to attain. Will you allow me to share a few characteristics that I have observed?

1. They are change agents. You can't tell them what they "cannot do," because that word is not in their vocabulary. They are the ones who believe that anything is possible and attainable if you put in the work. As Dr. Angela Davis is known for saying: "You have to act as if it were possible to radically transform the world. And you have to do it all the time." Good leaders live in this reality – they are committed to making our world a better place and they live out this mantra daily.

2. They believe in sharing the stage. A leader is only as good as those on her/his board or team. They aren't intimidated by others' gifts. Instead, they encourage and empower others to contribute and lead. They understand and demonstrate that micro-management is the least effective way to motivate their group or team. They also tend to construct diverse teams. They don't want everyone to agree with them, they value hearing all sides and perspectives—because they know the power of working and thinking panoramically and globally, instead of myopically.

3. They are slow to criticize and swift to praise. You may have heard the expression: "Be the woman who fixes another woman's crown without telling the world it was crooked." That's what a good leader does – she/he protects those under his/her charge and won't publicly embarrass them whenever possible.

4. They take responsibility for negative outcomes. In the military, we call that "falling on the sword." Good leaders will take the heat for the entire team and then work with the team to deconstruct what went wrong and reconstruct a new best practices posture for the future. In other words, they are accountable to themselves and to those whom they lead, and they aren't afraid to say, "I apologize."

5. They have a sense of humor and balanced perspective on life. By this, I mean that they like a good laugh and can laugh at themselves as well. They are serious when they need to be but know that there should also be time set aside for self-care and light moments.

6. They are teachable and lifelong learners. They are eternally curious and open to learning new ways of thinking, being, serving and working. Need an example? When my own beloved mother was in the last month of her life on earth, we went shopping for the latest iteration of the iPhone. Mom was always determined to learn any new technology. She was not just a consumer, but a consummate producer, and loved learning the terminology, theory, and inner workings of any new technology.

7. They aren't afraid to fail, because they have accepted that failure is a part of the process to success. Or, as Michael Jordan taught: "I've missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. Twenty-six times, I've been trusted to take the game winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed."

What about you? I invite you to reflect upon the leaders whom you admire. What is it about them that attracts you? What do they do that makes you want to imitate them? May I ask you to do one more thing? Make time to reach out to your favorite leader within the next 30 days and thank them. Share with them how they have mentored you, tell them what you admire about their leadership style and practices and thank them for their service and sacrifices made on behalf of the better good. It can be lonely at the top, so to speak, and sometimes just hearing that what you do is seen and valued is fuel for the leader to continue to lead with excellence. Besides, as my grandmother used to always say: *"it's just nice to be nice and it costs you nothing, to do so."*
